
So, if you run a group, club or organisation and would like to write an article about it for inclusion in the next issue of the newsletter, we would be pleased to hear from you.

News from the Chair

It gives me great pleasure to make a contribution to this first newsletter, and my thanks to the BSS team who have put it together.

This is our 10th year in operation and we never imagined how successful Strutts would be. Belper is a more vibrant community as a result of our efforts – thanks to all our volunteers and users who have made it possible.

You can see from the ‘What’s On Listing’, the number and variety of groups using the centre and we are becoming victims of our own success. We often struggle to cover the extended opening hours and I would welcome new volunteers to join our team. If you would like to know more, please email us at reception@strutts.org.uk.

Much has happened over the last couple of years, a lot of it unseen – essential repairs to the roof, pointing and gutters and the replacement of the gas main last year. We are looking forward in the next few years to the redecoration and refurbishment of both the communal areas and some of the classrooms, hopefully more visible improvements.

To ensure Strutts is accessible to all, we were delighted when the lift was installed nearly two years ago, enabling everyone to reach the larger rooms upstairs. We have also created accessible toilets by the lift on both floors. Future plans include a video door entry from the playground to provide easier access for wheelchair users.

In terms of the building, I would like to thank Belper Strutts Society for their fundraising activities and subsequent purchase of new competition standard table tennis tables, folding tables and more comfortable stacking chairs.

Last year we took the decision to licence rooms for exclusive use to provide some financial stability to the project and to increase the daytime usage. We were pleased to welcome DCC Adult Education, Deaf-inately Women and Juliet Cooper’s Restorative Pilates Studio to Strutts. We have also given licences to the Derbyshire Archaeological Society Library (see article) and Belper Historical Society for storage facilities.

In the coming year we are improving the safety and security of the site – extending the CCTV, improving external lighting and fire safety features. In response to user requests, we are looking to improve wi-fi coverage throughout the building.

We are also keen to create an accessible cinema as a need has been identified locally and there is much support for this. We plan to form a steering group soon to make this happen. If you are interested in being involved, please get in touch with me.

Together we can make a positive difference for the community of Belper.

History of Strutts

As a school.....

The school was built 1907–09, commissioned by George Herbert Strutt - a direct descendant of Jedediah Strutt, the famous industrialist who developed the cotton industry in Belper. He was given the go-ahead to provide a school for the town in March 1907 and chose a site for it opposite the town's workhouse, Babington House.

By the spring of 1909 the work was complete, and the school was officially opened on May 7th by the Duke of Devonshire. The building was presented by George Herbert Strutt to the County Council for use as a Higher Grade Elementary School and Pupil Teacher Centre.

In the hall at Strutts you can see the bust of George Herbert Strutt. This was presented to him in 1910 in appreciation of him providing the land and paying for the building of the school, after about 1,500 people from around Belper had donated money towards it.

Later, the school became a Grammar School – the Herbert Strutt School. In 1973, following a shake-up in education, it became a Middle School, then in 1986 it became Herbert Strutt Primary School. It remained a primary school until its closure in February 2007, when children moved to a new school at the Parks off Bargate Road, taking the Herbert Strutt name with them.

What happened next.....

When it was not needed as a school, the original 1909 Strutt conveyance said what should happen:

"...the said hereitaments and premises hereby conveyed shall be held IN TRUST for and be conveyed and assured to the Belper Urban District Council or its successors in fee simple for the use and benefit of the inhabitants of the township of Belper aforesaid in such manner as the said Urban District Council or its successors shall from time to time determine...."

In December 2006, at the first open meeting of the Belper Civic Forum, the future of this building came out on top of the list of people's concerns. The vast majority wished the building to be converted to community use. Most wished for it be a library and adult community education centre.

Other suggested uses were community meeting rooms, conference centre, performing arts venue, business start-up centre, an archive for Belper artefacts and photographs and partial conversion to apartments to help pay for community use.

Amber Valley Borough Council succeeded Belper Urban District Council. It took over 2 years to persuade Derbyshire County Council and Amber Valley Borough Council to hand over the site to our charity, the Guardians of Strutts, for use as a Community Centre. Derbyshire County Council had estimated that the school would require £1.4M for essential repairs and many expected us to fail.



Strutts Community Centre...

Today (Summer 2019), the building is a thriving community centre run by the Guardians of Strutts Charity and supported by the Belper Strutts Society. We opened as a Community Centre on 23rd September 2009 with no funds, but a few committed users, including Derwent Brass (see article), who were already in residence, a playgroup called the Dandelion Clock, Belper Model Railway Group and Kim Hunt Dog Training. Our only income was the room hire fees.

Loyal volunteers did everything from cleaning to essential safety repairs. We didn't switch on the heating until the first frosts in November. The number of users steadily increased over the first couple of years until we not only covered the running costs but were able to pay for some repairs to the building.

This year will be our tenth anniversary and the Centre now has a wide range of activities taking place every day. Since those early days we have successfully turned a redundant building into a major asset for the benefit of the people of Belper. This is a fantastic achievement by a group of local people who started out with nothing but the passion to make a difference for the benefit of their community.



The library holds a very interesting collection of books on Archaeology, Local History, Industrial Archaeology and Architecture, all relating to Derbyshire. ..... *A message from one of our first customers!*

Derwent Brass is a major success story in the Midland's rich heritage of brass banding.

Formed in 1992 in Derby, it quickly established itself as a most popular concert attraction and promptly climbed the ranks of the brass band league to the dizzy heights of the Championship Section (the Premier League in football terms) where it remains to this day.

The band continues to decorate the band room with silverware from contests nationwide and is proud to represent Belper and indeed Derbyshire as not only the county's number one ranked brass band, but in the wider context, consistently ranked within the top 70 brass bands in the world. They have also continued to improve their artistic programme both musically and aesthetically, resulting in some of the finest brass band concert performances you can experience in the country

Originally formed in Derby, the band struggled intermittently with a permanent residence to call its home. If you consider the sheer logistics of an entire brass band (complete with a wealth of percussion, uniform, a library of music, chairs, stands, and much more) not having a permanent space in which to rehearse, it is akin to setting up a concert for every single rehearsal .

Ultimately the band became homeless and was operating out of the back of a van. It could have easily become the demise of Derwent Brass.

Around this time in 2005, a brass band well known to Belper - Thornton's Brass (now resurrected as a non-competitive Masson Mills Band) were in the process of folding and kindly invited us to use their space. Derwent Brass grabbed the opportunity to move to Belper and reside in their former band room at the Herbert Strutt Primary School.

Sadly, it wasn't long before the rumours started to circulate that the school was to close, and this was finally confirmed during the summer of 2007. We were once again very busy trying to find an alternative home and the local authorities did grant a temporary extension for the band to stay on the premises.

During Easter 2008 the school was mothballed, and the band asked to leave...

"I recall vividly the absolute sense of frustration and anxiety that the band was again to become homeless. Following various discussions and meetings, I managed to persuade the school owners to allow the band to stay onsite on a temporary basis, though it meant we had to promptly relocate to the playground classroom over the course of a weekend.



That Friday I, together with my partner Madeline and [Band Manager at the time] Rob Stew, burnt the candle deep into the night as we prepared the room to be clean and secure ahead of the band setting up the room and moving all its equipment in over the weekend. A very tiring time for sure, but it was a relief to secure the band some further tenancy."


Following the closure of the school, Neil and Madeline immediately became involved in the "Saving Strutts for Belper" campaign, offering and hosting campaign meetings in the band room. The Belper Strutts Society (BSS) was duly formed (see article on the history of Strutts). Proudly, Neil and Madeline are among the founding members of BSS, and Derwent Brass were the first user group to be granted a licence at the premises that very year – finally, a place to call home!

During this formative period Derwent Brass helped with fundraising for the project, performing at the centenary celebration event in May and later a concert in August. In the Musical Director's report of the 16th AGM of Derwent Brass, Keith Leonard (now Music Director Emeritus) reflected that securing the future of the band room was his ultimate highlight for the year and thanked Neil and Madeline for all their hard work. In 2011 Neil became a trustee of the "Guardians of Strutts" and has since managed some of the significant improvements to the site including the re-landscaping of the centre grounds, physical access to the centre, roof refurbishment and installation of the lift.

Since moving in, many improvements have been made to the room, by Derwent Brass, to maximise its potential as a rehearsal venue. At a basic level, re-plastering, and painting were initially done, followed by the installation of a kitchen sink, ceiling fans, new furniture, drapes and bespoke acoustic panels together with various aesthetic changes.

"A brass band's rehearsal venue is a very special place. We have a huge sign in our band room: 'Welcome to Derwent Brass. Here we make music and friendship through inspiration, harmony and aspiration to perform at our very best'. I think that says it all for me. With the constant use of this space we have been able to concentrate our time on what matters most; the running of the organisation both as a band and as a registered charity, and ultimately producing first class brass music.

I doubt highly we would have reached the standard we are today without the continuity of rehearsal we now enjoy, which has resulted in some spectacular events, contest results and artistic collaborations. Only the other week did we perform to a capacity audience in Derby Theatre and will no doubt have fantastic support from the people of Belper for our forthcoming Remembrance and Christmas concerts later in the year at St. Peter's. We are of course indebted to Neil, Madeline and everyone involved at Strutts who have allowed us to make this happen. We enjoy a very special relationship with the Trustees and look forward to developing this, and the facilities wherever possible, in the future. Thank you.



If you want to see our rehearsal space and experience the band in full rehearsal mode first-hand, you are more than welcome to visit - we meet every Thursday (8-10pm) in the playground building.



‘WHAT’S ON’ LISTING

Although a great deal happens at Strutts, we’re not directly responsible for everything, as Strutts simply rents the premises to members of the community for their use. As we’re often asked what happens here, we thought we’d include the latest ‘What’s On’ Listing currently on the Strutts website (from 13th May to 10th June 2019), to give an idea of all the different activities available to the community.

All direct contact details for these groups are on the website. Please be aware that the group listing changes each month, and not all bookings are published as some customers do not allow us to do so under GDPR (General Data Protection Regulations).

A wide variety of **U3A** classes and groups regularly use our building, including ; Art Appreciation, Shakespeare, Dance, Italian Beginners, Table Tennis, Meditation, Badminton, Tai Chi, Scrabble, Line Dancing, French Conversation, Latin, Creative Crafts, Painting and Drawing, and Philosophy. The U3A Open Meeting is also held here, once a month for members and prospective members.

Derbyshire County Council runs a number of Adult Education courses here at Strutts, also, the **WEA** and **Age UK** who run a ‘Strictly No Falling’ course. You can learn lip-reading, French and German or upholstery to give you a flavour of some of the adult education courses. There are also **DCC** Adult Care programmes – Weight Management, ‘Stop Smoking’, and the **DCHS** Xpert Diabetes Programme.
